Behind the scenes battles have been underway for many months between proponents of new sites for the movie makers and the city officials and chambers of commerce of area's where the movie sets are now located.

Currently MGM employment at its Culver City site varies from 2,200 to 3,500. The movie maker has used the property ever since the birth of the movie industry over 40 years ago.

Conejo area is being touted, it is understood, as a future home for the movie maker because of its proximity to many outdoor movie making locations, its nearness to the homes of many stars who live in San Fernando Valley, Beverly Hills and the West Los Angeles area, and the availability of large acreages at prices well under the current
